Mayor Robinson, at the meeting of the City Council of Oakland last evening, presented his first message. The Mayor stated that he had carefully examined the details of expenses for the previous six years, and said: "By tais examination I find that the total expenditures for the city roverment in 1881 were in round numbers, \$100,000 users than they were in 1876. This increase appears to be mainly for current expenses, and occurs as follows: Increase in cost of Police Department, \$12,000; in Street Department, \$17,000; in School Department, \$18,000; in Health Office, \$2700; in Astreey's office, \$28,700; in librium streets, \$18,000; in Health Office, \$2700; in Astreey's office, \$2300, and in the City Pound \$2000.
